

BCNA at Work – Focus on Safety & Well Being

Pedestrian Safety, Community Disruptions, Personal Safety

The BCNA and the BCNA Safety Committee are responding to community concerns about pedestrian safety, disruptions from side shows and other reckless and noisy events, and concerns about personal safety. **Some specific areas of focus include**:

- Reducing incidents of unsafe driving along the Embarcadero.
- Determining how to crack down on the use of motorized scooters on sidewalks.
- Mitigating pedestrian injuries at troublesome intersections.
- Reducing disturbances from sideshows and noise-making events.
- Addressing personal safety and fire issues associated with homelessness.

The BCNA works with many San Francisco organizations to effect positive change.

- We participate with the Community Police Advisory Board (CPAB) and at community meetings with Central Station Captain Eric Kim and his officers.
- Work with the District 3 Supervisor (a big 'Thank You' to former Supervisor Aaron Peskin, and a hearty "Welcome" to our new Supervisor Danny Sauter).
- Engage with the Municipal Transportation Authority (SFMTA), Entertainment Commission, Dept. Public Works, Dept. Public Health, Dept. Park & Recreation, and SF Port Authority.
- Partner with non-profits, including the Downtown SF Partnership community benefit district, Jackson Square Merchants Association, North Beach Citizens, and Walk SF.
- Advocate for improving safety and personal security with our business community, including The Gateway, North Park/ Lincoln Property Management, and Safeway.

During the last 2 years, the BCNA has:

- Improved SFMTA Battery St. Bike Lane with a Left Turn & Pedestrian Crosswalks.
- Secured SFMTA traffic-calming measures at Broadway/Sansome, Drumm/Jackson, and daylight spaces at the Jackson/Davis intersections.
- Advocated for the enforcement of motorized scooter sidewalk rules.
- Advocated for more effective sideshow enforcement.
- Supported more technology use (e.g., drones, speed cameras, license plate readers).
- Monitored new nighttime entertainment zones & other noise-generating events.
- Helped expand the City's security camera program in partnership with SafeCity Connect.
- Partnered with North Beach Citizens to help 12+ unhoused neighbors find homes and services.
- Worked with City to reduce pedestrian safety threats below a Telegraph Hill encampment.
- Advocated for speed cameras on The Embarcadero, Broadway & Columbus Ave.

- Advocated for license plate readers at The Embarcadero & Washington Street.
- Began surveying sidewalk trip hazards within the Barbary Coast for submission to DPW.

The City and SFPD must maintain a competent, effective, and adequate police force while providing communities with the necessary resources to address the broad spectrum of human problems we face, without over-reliance on police. That's where we, as a neighborhood organization, come in—setting neighborhood safety goals and engaging with SFPD, other City agencies, non-profits, and our neighbors to achieve our objectives humanely and effectively.

What can you do?

- Our city's leaders cannot act unless they know our neighborhood's safety issues.
 - Therefore, if you see something, say something, and share any concerns, especially threats to personal safety.
 - If it is not an active emergency, please email the BCNA Safety Committee
 (bcnasafety@gmail.com) describing the incident (time, date, details) and include a
 photo if you feel comfortable.
 - o **If you feel threatened in an emergency, call 911**. Then email our committee, and we will report/follow up on the incident to SFPD Central Station.
 - Report non-emergency issues to the SFPD Non-Emergency number (415-534-0123).
 - You can also text incident information to TIP411 (enter 415-847411 in the "To" field) or call the SFPD Anonymous 24/7 Tip Line (415-575-4444 or 415-392-2623).
- Support the efforts of our political leaders to ensure SFPD is fully staffed. Central Station is severely understaffed (only ~90 compared to an authorized staffing level of 120).
- Inform our political leaders that you support modern technology, such as surveillance cameras, drones, and license plate readers. These tools can assist SFPD in enforcing our laws and enable more effective use of SFPD's limited resources.
- When you see an SFPD officer, thank them for their work to keep our neighborhood safe.
- Do NOT confront criminal perpetrators. The nationwide trend of relaxed gun control has resulted in many criminals being armed.
